Handler Notes:

- 1) At least three other dogs must be present during the test even if not all are dogs are testing.
- Handlers may treat/reward the dog <u>after</u> completion of the task but not lure the dog with treat to perform the task during testing.
- Any language or phrase may be used instead of "Heel", "Down", "Sit", etc. so long as they are used consistently throughout testing
- 4) Handlers may use verbal, visual or both type commands during any of the exercises.
- Handler teams are required to successfully perform any 2 of the 3 stay position exercises: Sit-stay, Down-Stay or Stand-Stay.
- 6) If a task is not successfully completed, it may be retested no more than three times.
- 7) When leaving your dog on Sit-Stay, Down-Stay or Stand-Stay the Handler must walk away turning their back to the dog handlers may not walk backwards away from the dog.
- B) Dogs may heel on either side of the handler; however please note that the left side position is required in all AKC Obedience competitions.
- 9) Any dog that aggresses toward a human or another during testing will not receive a passing score.
- 10) Any dog that eliminates (urinates or defecates) during testing will not receive a passing score.
